# To achieve your Bronze Arts Award there are four parts to complete:

Part A: explore the arts a participant

Part B: explore the arts as an

audience member

Part C: arts inspiration

Part D: arts skills share

For Bronze Arts Award based on music you need to provide evidence of your music related activities and show how your learning has progressed.

### Using this evidence portfolio from

For each part of this form you can use the spaces to write in, and to share links to online images, photos, film, and sound recordings. If you have evidence that can't be shared in these spaces make a note of what it is, and where it can be found - and ask your adviser for advice.

Do note, the text boxes do expand, so you can keep going if you use up the space. You can also paste links to Google documents, or an online photo or image gallery.

### You'll be:

- taking part in music activity and learning new skills
- listening to music and sharing your opinions
- researching someone from the world of music and sharing what you find out
- passing on a musical skill to someone else and reflecting on how it went

Any styles, genres, or forms of music can be used – from composition or body percussion to writing lyrics – or using online music apps!

You will be supported by your Arts Award adviser – this could be your teacher, music tutor, youth worker or project leader.

We all listen to music made by different musicians, of different styles/genres. This includes everything from orchestral music to rock and pop, DJ music to folk song, or hip hop, R&B and rap.

Make a record of at least three different types of music that you have listened to. You can listen to live or recorded music, online, at home or in school. You might have heard it at a concert or listened to your school choir. Say what type of music it is, and where and how you heard it.

Choose one of these music performances/
recordings and provide a bit more information
- and your own personal opinion - or review of
this performance.

### Include:

- the name of the piece of music or song and who it was performed by
- how and where you heard it, and the date
- your own personal views about this music
- any other thoughts about the quality of the performance/recording

### Tips to get you started:

Think about commenting on the way the music was performed / presented. What style / genre of music is this? Who is performing it? How did it make you feel? Do you think the music effectively expressed what the performers / composer wanted? What were the dynamics (loud/soft etc) like? If there is more than one performer how well did they work together? Has it inspired you to listen to more music like this? If there are lyrics could you hear them – and what did they communicate to you? What would you say made this a good performance? What would make it even better?





## Now share your review with someone else

You could:

- Post your review online (check with your adviser first about the best place to do this and have a look at voicemag.uk/artsaward)
- Read your review out to friends, family, or class group
- Share your review on a school noticeboard, in a newsletter, or as a podcast

This is about choosing, finding out about, and then summarising information about a musician, composer, singer, performer, or other music leader who inspires you. Your musician could be someone very well known - or someone you know yourself. This could be someone from music history or someone living and working now.

Do some research and find out their musical life and career. Create a summary of what you found out. This could be a poster, collage, a booklet, or an audio/video presentation. You could research online, in books, talking to experts, or by interviewing your musician directly if you can.

### **BRONZE ARTS AWARD PART D: MUSICAL SKILLS SHARE**



To complete this part you need to pass on a music related skill to someone else – by planning and delivering a short skill share activity, and reviewing how well it went.

You can pass the music skill on to a friend, family member, a group, or a teacher.

What kind of activities help to pass on skills?

- A mini lesson one to one or to a group face to face or online
- A step-by-step "how to" guide written, diagrams, or filmed...
- A demonstration face to face or online
- A question and answer session
- Musical games activity, online, or board games
- A workshop
