What's Bronze Arts Award?

Bronze Arts Award opens young people's eyes to the arts, helping them to shine in art forms of their choice. It's all about active participation, building confidence and rewarding personal challenges and achievements. For many young people Bronze Award is a life-changing programme.

From animation to beatboxing, circus skills to fashion design, photography to poetry, Arts Award is a flexible and inclusive programme. It embraces all interests and backgrounds, helping everyone to unlock their potential and develop as artists and arts leaders.

- Bronze Arts Award is a Level 1 qualification meaning that young people work at GCSE level (grades D to G)
- This four-part award is open to anyone aged 11 or over
- It's built around enjoying the arts and takes an average of 40 hours to complete
- There are no entry requirements and there is no set time limit for completing the award
- Arts Award can help ensure schools are meeting their Social Moral Spiritual and Cultural requirements as defined by Ofsted, as well as helping to demonstrate they are offering a broad and balanced curriculum

Why do Bronze Award?

Bronze Arts Award provides opportunities for developing art form knowledge, communication and leadership. It enriches the lives of young people and helps them to:

- manage time, work independently and meet deadlines
- reflect on their own learning and achievements and develop metacognition
- help others develop their skills and work in a team
- broaden their understanding about what arts and creativity is all about
- learn what talents they have and skills they can develop further
- see professionals at work and be inspired by them
- explore artistic options they might never have considered
- express themselves in creative ways and have fun
- discover the sheer enjoyment of creating and participating in an art form

Doing Bronze Arts Award can help prepare young people for future life by enabling them to develop as artists and arts leaders. It supports the development of transferable skills through independent learning and motivation, builds confidence and helps young people gain a sense of accomplishment.

Chingford Foundation School is a large co-educational comprehensive school and sixth form in East London. They offer Arts Award in a range of art forms, including performing and visual arts, creative writing and technical production. 400 young people have achieved awards to date, including through Arts Award Shakespeare Challenge and the First World War Special Edition Arts Award certificate.

Dance United Yorkshire is a Community Interest Group working with marginalised young people. Bronze Arts Award has helped nurture talents that would otherwise have not been recognised. A cohort of young people from across Keighley in West Yorkshire worked towards their awards by taking part in a six-week project dancing for six hours a day, five days a week, learning a 20-minute piece of choreography that was performed in front of a sell-out audience.

What will young people do?

- take part in an arts activity and learn new skillscould be fashion, radio broadcasting or breakdancing
- 2 arts review attend an arts event, record their response and tell others what they think
- 3 arts inspiration research the work and life of an artist or craftsperson
- 4 arts skills share pass on arts skills to others by leading a workshop or giving a presentation and demonstrating the skills involved

Young people create a portfolio to keep a record of their creative journey. This can be a video diary, an audio recording, a blog, a website, a cartoon book or anything else they want so long as it records evidence of their work.

Bronze Arts Award is a great way of exposing young people to arts they may never have experienced or seen before. It not only helps them experience something new but it inspires them to aim high, enjoy success, build resilience and gain a qualification.

How do I get involved?

To get started, train as an Arts Award adviser. As an adviser you will provide support for young people working towards their award, acting as assessor, facilitator and mentor.

You don't have to be an arts specialist to deliver Arts Award. Training to be an adviser involves a one-day course available at various locations across the UK. Alternatively, you can book an in-house training session in your setting for groups of six or more.

Once trained, access a range of support, from our online community through to one-to-one support visits. Our online resource library contains everything you need to help with planning, delivery and assessment, as well as case studies, ideas and advice.
